

YOUR GUIDE TO THE CITIZENS REDISTRICTING COMMISSION



WHAT IS IT?

The Citizens Redistricting Commission is a 13-member commission that was created as a result of the passing of Proposal 2, a Michigan Constitutional amendment, in November 2018.

WHAT DOES THE COMMISSION DO?

This Commission is in control of drawing the district lines for the Michigan House of Representatives, Michigan Senate, and for Michigan's members of the U.S. House of Representatives every 10 years, after the Census has been taken.



HOW WAS IT CREATED?

The Citizens Redistricting Commission was created because of the passing of Proposal 2, a Constitutional amendment in November 2018.

WHO IS ON THE COMMISSION?

The Commission is made up of 4 self-identified Republicans, 4 self-identified Democrats, and 5 unaffiliated registered Michigan voters. Those who are partisan political officeholders or candidates, employees or close relatives of a partisan political officeholders or candidates, or registered political lobbyists are not able to serve.



HOW CAN I BE ON THE COMMISSION?

You must be a registered Michigan voter to apply to be on the Commission. The application will be available in late 2019. You can currently note your interest on the Michigan Secretary of State's website and sign up to be notified when the application is available.

HOW ELSE CAN I GET INVOLVED?

Meetings of the Citizens Redistricting Commission are open to the public. After the selection of the Commission, the meeting dates will be posted and you will be able to attend the meetings of the Commission and there will be opportunities for public input.
